THE DAYS OF "COMFORTABLE CATHOLICISM" ARE OVER

Cardinal Sean P. O'Malley of Boston served as keynote speaker at the 10th annual National Catholic Prayer Breakfast in Washington DC. Cardinal O'Malley called for immigration reform for Central and Latin American immigrants saying "They are not evil invaders but people seeking to feed and clothe their families in safety, much like the immigrants from Ireland, Italy, Germany and Poland."

Our past evangelization missions were to Papua New Guinea highlands, but Cardinal O'Malley pointed out past that now is the United States and Western Europe that needs evangelizing. These societies live "in the residue of Christian culture" creating a challenge to make people there "disciples and disciple-makers". A true call to stewardship.

Opening speaker Robert P. George, the McCormick professor of jurisprudence at Princeton University and chair of the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom said the days of "socially acceptable Christianity" and "comfortable Catholicism" are over. We should ask ourselves "Am I ashamed of the Gospel?"

As stewards of the Gospel we must "Go make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). However, our very nation's society pressures us to keep to ourselves and not share the Gospel. Society describes Gospel teachings, and therefore Catholicism, as out of date, insensitive, bigoted and hateful. Many Catholics, especially young Catholics, do not want to associate themselves with such definitions. The ultimatum is either conform to secular views or say nothing.

According to George those who witness the Gospel are marked men and women, exposed to scorn and reproach. There are actual heavy costs of discipleship. Catholics are finding themselves discriminated against, losing jobs, and missing out on due recognition and job advancement. George points out it "may even cost one treasure friendships" and "produce familial discord and even the alienation of family members." George likened such changing circumstances to the difference between Palm Sunday and Good Friday. "The memory of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem has faded. ... The love affair with Jesus and his Gospel and his church is over. Elite sectors of the cultures of Europe and the Americas no longer welcome his message," he said. "Friday has come."

What is a steward to do? A good stewards makes a return to the Lord with increase. When we share Jesus with others are we sharing a Palm Sunday savior or a beaten lamb we crucified? As stewards God entrusts us to cultivate and share His many gifts. This includes the Gospels. Stewards are evangelizers who knock on doors and shout from rooftops their love of the Gospel. How convenient Pope Francis' first Apostolic Exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium *The Joy of the Gospels* rekindles our love affair with Jesus.

This time of turmoil in our country is not a time to wait it out. As the past Easter season revealed, Christ has risen. He is not longer walking this earth. We have been saved, we must bring the Savior to those who've lost Him.



St. Theresa of Avila wrote "Christ has no body but yours, no hands, no feet on earth but yours. Despite claims that Catholics are "on the wrong side of history" on such issues, George said, "history is not God. God is God. History is not our judge. God is our judge." Catholic News Services May 13–2014
